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NOTES FROM THE POTOMAC

As you all know, recently there has been a significant up-tick in the flow of news coming out of Washington, DC which means the cable news networks are probably raking in advertising revenue. Viewership data supports this with the combined viewership for the three largest cable news networks increasing by 23%, compared to their third quarter averages, since the announcement of the impeachment process. Also, we might have finally found out that all it takes to unite the partisans that populate the DC area is for the home team to reach the World Series. And finally, happy Thanksgiving to everyone.

Personal Finance—

2020 COLA. The Consumer Price Index data for September has been reported, and Federal retirees will receive a boost of 1.6% in their retirement checks. Although this is less than the 2.8% increase in 2019, it is welcomed. And because it is less than 2%, the 1.6% bump will also apply to FERS employees.

Interest Rates—In September, the Federal Reserve (FED) cut its Federal Funds interest rate by another quarter of a percentage point to 2.0%, signaling that there was continuing concern about the effect of an expanding global economic slowdown and the Administration's trade policy on the US economy. The Federal Funds rate is the interest rate at which banks and other depository institutions lend money to each other so they can meet reserve requirements, and lowering the rate increases the supply of money.

The President was not pleased with the FED action and called for the FED to reduce interest rates to zero. The FED is highly unlikely to cut interest rates much lower since its current target is between 1.75% and 2.00%. Economists expect that there will be another cut in the Federal funds rate in November, but officials at the FED don't see the rate cut below 1.5% through the end of 2020. The FED is concerned that if it lowers rates too much over the next few quarters, it will have very limited leverage to stimulate the economy if the US falls into a recession.

Health Insurance—Here's a reminder that the Federal health insurance open season will begin on November 11th and end on December 9th. More interestingly, health insurance premiums for Federal workers and retirees will increase by 5.6% in 2020, while the government's share will only increase by 3.2%. In 2019 employee and retiree premium costs only increased by 1.5%. About 8.2 million current and retired Federal employees are covered by Federal health insurance and few, only 5% to 6%, of the enrollees change plans each year.

2020 Federal Employee Pay Raise—On August 30th President Trump reversed course and issued his alternative pay plan for 2020, endorsing a 2.6% across-the-board pay increase for civilian federal employees, effectively ending the administration's push for a pay freeze next year. Each year, the President is required to submit an alternative pay plan to Congress by the end of August, or else significant automatic pay increases will take effect under the Federal Employee Pay Comparability Act. Had Trump not issued an alternative pay plan, locality pay would rise by 24.01% next year, and base pay would increase 2.6%.

The pay increase proposal essentially defuses most debate over a pay raise in Congress. Although the Senate has not unveiled any of its spending bills, the House has passed funding legislation that would have provided an average 3.1% pay increase for federal workers, a 2.6% across-the-board raise coupled with an average 0.5% increase in locality pay. The President added that the administration would continue to pursue working toward a performance-based pay system.

Hill Update—On October 17th, **Steve Censky**, Deputy Secretary of Agriculture testified before the Senate Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry on the status of farm bill implementation. Mr. Censky highlighted CRP, EQIP, CSP, and RCPP activities in outlining conservation program progress. Regulatory News—NRCS Program rules are continuing through the normal process and are in the final stages of clearance at OMB before publication. The RCPP rule has not yet gone to OMB and will be published later in the first quarter as an Interim Final Rule. Meanwhile, these programs are operating under existing regulations consistent with changes made by the 2018 Farm Bill.

Conservation Innovation Grants (CIG)—NRCS is in the process of evaluating proposals and anticipates announcing awards in the first quarter of fiscal year 2019. There were two CIG funding announcements in May 2019:

- Up to \$25 million in On-Farm Conservation Innovation Trials (On-Farm Trials),
- Up to \$12.5 million in National Conservation Innovation Grants (CIG)

There were 73 proposals from 33 states submitted for the On-Farm Trials and 114 proposals from 38 states submitted for the National CIG.

Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP)—NRCS announced funding for the updated Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP) on September 3rd. Potential partners are encouraged to submit proposals that will improve the nation's water quality, combat drought, enhance soil health, support wildlife habitat and protect agricultural viability. Wetland Reserve Enhancement Partnership (WREP)—On September 13th, NRCS announced investment of \$48 million in wetland conservation projects in eight states. WREP project partners are providing nearly \$2.3 million in matching funds, bringing the total to more than \$50 million. The projects will protect, restore and enhance more than 15,000 acres of wetlands in critical watersheds in Arkansas, Illinois, Iowa, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri and Tennessee. NRCS evaluated proposals based upon partner contributions, the ability to address resource concerns within NRCS designated special initiative areas, and expected benefits to agricultural producers impacted by record flooding over the past year.

Conservation Reserve Program (CRP)—On September 27th, the Farm Service Agency (FSA) announced the availability of a Programmatic Environmental Assessment. The assessment covers programmatic changes that have not been evaluated previously and is available to the public for review. Comments are due by October 27th. Any comments received after that date will be considered to the extent possible. FSA is requesting comments on the proposed alternatives and their potential impacts on the human environment. 2020 USDA Appropriations

The US government is currently funded at FY-2019 levels by a continuing resolution that Congress passed, and the President signed on September 27th, 2019. That continuing resolution is set to expire on November 21st, 2019, and Congress is expected to kick the can down the road with a second continuing resolution. “Unless a miracle happens around here with the House and Senate, we will have to put forth another CR,” **Sen. Richard Shelby**, R-Ala., chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee, [told reporters](#) earlier this week. Shelby expected that the second continuing resolution would likely fund agencies through February or March.

The House has approved 10 of the 12 annual appropriations measures, but the Senate has not approved any of their 12 appropriation bills. The Senate is scheduled to resume consideration of a package of several appropriation bills, including the Agriculture bill next week. It’s worth noting that under “regular order” the House and Senate would have agreed on the budget allocations to each of the 12 appropriations committees last spring. This is critical because the committees are making different assumptions about how much funding they will be allocated. Consequently, this will be one more item that will need to be resolved by the conference committee.

Economic Research Service and National Institute of Food and Agriculture Relocation

Although USDA has implemented its relocation of most of the Economic Research Service and National Institutes of Food and Agriculture staff from Washington, DC to the Kansas City area, opposition to the move continues. On October 21st, a group comprised of associations and nonprofits issued a statement supporting a provision in the 2020 House Agricultural Appropriations bill that discourages the move. However, the Senate Agricultural Appropriations bill underwrites the relocation by providing funds to facilitate the move. Resolving the differences will be the responsibility of the Conference Committee. Long-time agriculture journalist **Jerry Hagstrom** reports that a congressional aide said that the House provision is unlikely to succeed, but the fight to stop the move is important because other USDA agencies could be moved next.

Farm Income Uncertainties

The Trump Administration issued a second round of tariff-war induced payments to farmers amounting to \$16 billion. This brings the total trade-related payments for farmers to \$28 billion. To put this in context, the farm bailout associated with the tariff war is now more than twice the 2009 bailout of Ford, Chrysler, and GM.

For American producers, the hit to exports has further strained finances that are at a breaking point because of a six-year slump in prices for agricultural commodities. An ERS report on farm finances indicated that net farm income is projected to be down 29% this year from 2013 levels.

An increase in debt and bankruptcies among U.S. farmers was also reported by ERS in their August forecast of farm income. According to USDA, debt levels in the farm sector are at their highest levels since 1982. This is mostly due to increased real estate debt, which accounted for 60% of farm debt in 2019. Both farm sector assets and equity are expected to be about the same in 2019 compared to the prior year, which means that the debt to asset ratio (a key measure of farm financial health) for U.S. farmers will increase in 2019. Bankruptcies have also been trending upwards since 2016. All of these trends are concerning and worth watching both in the short and longer-term.


Repealing the Clean Water Rule

The question of which streams, lakes, wetlands and other water bodies across the U.S. should receive federal protection under the Clean Water Act has been a major controversy in environmental law over the past 20 years. The latest twist came on September 9th, 2019, when U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Administrator **Andrew Wheeler** and Army Assistant Secretary **R.D. James** signed a final rule repealing the Obama administration's "[Clean Water Rule](#)."

The Obama era regulation was intended to resolve uncertainty created by the 2006 Supreme Court decision, [Rapanos v. United States](#). The Rapanos ruling caused widespread confusion about which waters were covered, creating uncertainty for [farmers](#), [developers](#) and [conservation groups](#).

Efforts to clarify it through informal guidance or congressional action had failed, so the Obama administration proposed a new rule. It acted under mounting pressure from various quarters, including some members of the Supreme Court.

Announcing the repeal, Wheeler and James asserted that they were "providing greater regulatory certainty" and ending a federal power grab. But they face a stiff challenge from the rule's supporters, including more than a dozen state attorneys general, and courts may not buy their arguments. According to statistics compiled by New York University Law School, the administration has lost over 90% of lawsuits challenging its deregulatory policies, often for failing to comply with the Administrative Procedure Act.

Thanks, Tom for sharing your visit to China with all of us here and thanks for your continued involvement and contributions to "Conservation Work," the essence of our agency's foundation and purpose!

Doug Toews, retired NRCS Engineer, shared the great news with me that \$4.7 million in funding has been approved and allocated for critical remedial work on the Santa Monica Debris Basin. Following is a review and update going back to the disaster event put together by Santa Barbara County on this effort to improve the safety of this basin and its ability to protect Carpinteria.

Following the Thomas Fire in December of 2017, a high-intensity rainstorm on January 9, 2018, resulted in a debris flow that filled the Santa Monica Debris Basin to capacity. Constructed in 1978 as a component of the Carpinteria Valley Watershed Project, the Debris Basin successfully protected the City of Carpinteria from the disaster that befell the nearby Village of Montecito, where 450 homes were destroyed or damaged, and 23 residents perished. The ensuing cleanout effort immediately revealed the extreme challenges and limitations, in accessing the site and maintaining the structure. The Santa Monica Debris Basin remains at risk to future debris flows until full recovery of the burned watershed.

As local sponsors, the Santa Barbara County Flood Control District (SBCFCD) desires to maintain the Debris Basin in a much more expeditious manner, needing the ability to return the basin to full storage capacity between debris flow events that may occur within the same rainfall season.

After a thorough engineering investigation, remedial measures have now been recommended for federal funding through the Watershed and Flood Prevention Operations Program (PL-566), administered by the United States Department of Agriculture, Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS)." In cooperation with NRCS California, SBCFCD has requested \$4.6 million in remedial funds for the design and construction of the operational improvements needed." - **Santa Barbara County Flood Control District, August, 2019**

And now just in time for the newsletter, \$4.7 million in funding was actually approved and allocated allowing for technical assistance work to begin immediately for final design work and development of plans and specifications for the approved remedial measures. The award of a Contract for construction of the remedial measures is expected in 2020.

It has been a long and arduous journey to this point of restoring the original basin capacity after the disaster event, identifying needed remedial measures and now having funding approved to implement the needed measures. California NRCS is fortunate to have been able to work together with one of our Strongest Conservation Partners, Santa Barbara County Flood Control District under the leadership of Deputy Director Tom Fayram. Thanks Tom for the many years of excellent partnership NRCS has enjoyed working with you!

Fred Bubb writes: "Recently on TV, I saw the PA Dairy Princess competition which brought back memories. I worked for the State Office, I usually found myself staffing the SCS exhibit at the PA Farm Show. The PA Princess stopped at the exhibit and she said, "I had hoped that someday I would meet you so I could thank you for your work." After she introduced herself, I asked, "Are you Donald's daughter?" and she said, "Yes, I am that little shaver that followed your dad and me all over the farm as contour strips and other things were being done." Another "Yes." Small world and a wonderful memory."

Sam Young recalls: "In the mid-1970s I received a phone call from a contractor who had a number of 216 stream stabilization projects in the northern tier of PA. Our specifications called for supplying rock based upon a minimum weight for a large percentage of the rocks. He demanded I meet him at 7am the next morning because **Don Haines**, inspector on the job, was rejecting many loads of rock as not meeting minimum weight. This particular job required exceptionally large rock. I don't remember exact spec., but it seems it was 80 percent over 600 pounds for each rock."

Don and I met the owner of the construction firm on the site north of Towanda. The contractor had a load of rock dumped on site and demanded I tell him how much individual rocks weighed. I told him that Don would tell him what the estimated weight of each rock weighed based on a chart we developed for all 216 inspectors. After Don had measured five individual rocks pointed out by contractor, the contractor agreed Don knew what he was doing. The contractor had each rock weighed and marked before loading into the truck. Don's estimate was within 30 to 40 pounds for each rock. Since this contractor had a number of contracts, it ended complaints on all of them because all the inspectors were measuring average dimensions, computing volume of rock and reading the estimated weight from the same chart Don used.

This was not the only early morning or late afternoon meeting I and local DC's had with this contractor. **Don Lindsey** and I had a number of meetings with the contractor in Tioga County asking us to remove inspectors who were doing their jobs correctly, either rejecting unsuitable materials or documenting when equipment, paid for by hours operated, was sitting idle for extended time when they thought the inspector was not able to see them. The contractor was always trying to run up the hours for payment not earned."

SENIOR CONSERVATIONIST CHRONICLE

Senior Conservationist
Francis T. (Frank) Holt

Senior Conservationist Frank Holt was born October 14, 1934, in Protem, MO. Protem is a community in southeastern Taney County, Missouri, approximately two miles north of the Missouri-Arkansas state line.

Frank grew up on his family’s beef cow-calf farm and attended local schools through the 8th grade. He then attended School of the Ozarks High School in Point Lookout, MO. After graduation he worked as Forest Technician for the Missouri Department of Conservation from 1952 to 1954. In 1954 he joined the United States Coast Guard and served until 1958. On December 25, 1954, he married Donna Joyce Mottesheard at Branson, MO. After his service with the Coast Guard, Frank enrolled at the University of Missouri – Columbia. He graduated with a B.S. in Forestry in 1962. He continued as a graduate student there and earned an M.S. in Forest Management in 1963 and a Ph.D. in Forest Ecology in 1968.

After graduate school, Frank was hired by SCS in Missouri where he served as State Forester from 1968 to 1974. In 1974 he became State Forester for California SCS and worked there until 1977.

His next position with SCS took him east to Virginia where he was State Resource Conservationist until 1979. He then went to SCS National Headquarters where he held several positions. In 1979 he worked on the Resources Conservation Act initiative as an environmental specialist. After that, he was Acting Associate Director of the USDA Office of Environmental Quality, and National Coordinator of the RC&D Program. Frank left NHQ in 1983 when he was selected to be State Conservationist for Utah. He served in that position until 1994 when he retired from Federal service.

Upon retirement, Frank and Donna moved to western North Carolina. Currently he is involved in volunteer efforts with Country Creek Homeowners’ Association and other community endeavors in and around Weaverville and Asheville, NC. In May of this year, he completed “The Country Creek Story” a historical account of the development of his community north of Asheville. This December Frank and Donna will celebrate their 65th wedding anniversary. They have two children, Deborrah and David.

Frank received a Meritorious Achievement Award from the School of the Ozarks High School Alumni Association, Point Lookout, MO, in November 1979 “for continuing interest and loyalty to the School, Christian living, community service, personal achievement, and influence for the good in the world.” He received special recognition by the Utah Association of Conservation

Districts in November 1984 and again in November 1988 for strong and sustained support of conservation endeavors in the State of Utah. His biography is included in the 20th Edition, Marquis' *Who's Who in the West* and he is listed in the 4th Edition, American Biographical Institute's *Personalities of America* for "Contributions to USDA's Conservation Programs."

When asked if he would share his philosophy of career and life, Frank related that one must have goals, pursue them, and not look back. The Holts (Frank and Donna) will celebrate their 65th wedding anniversary on this Christmas Day.
