He was promoted to the rank of Corporal and was told he could keep the rank if he would re-enlist. He declined and was discharged on June 18, 1946. When home, he enrolled in the School of Engineering at the Branch Agricultural College in Cedar City, Utah in the Fall of 1946. He remembered that this mission began with the plane positioned for takeoff at the end of the runway while a fuel truck drove out to top off the B-29's tanks one final time. A chaplain was riding in the front seat of the truck. The mission was an American success, and Henry and his fellow aviators were returning to Guam when the radioman announced that <b>Hirohito</b> had surrendered. Weeks later, he boarded a troop ship and made his way through the Panama Canal to Fairfield Court in Stamford. Henry's military service paid for his education at the University of Connecticut and Yale University, where he earned civil engineering degrees. He married <b>Mary Pat Fraser</b> in 1954 and began a family immediately. Henry worked as an engineer for the USDA-Soil Conservation Service for his entire working life, helping municipalities manage flooding and create reservoirs for drinking water. He retired in 1986 as State Conservation Engineer. In later years, he was magnanimous about the change in philosophy that undammed many American rivers. While they coaxed from the land a variety of flora and fauna—Christmas trees, soybeans, sweet corn, grapes, apples, eggs, lambs, and trees (everywhere!)—when asked what they raised on the farm, Paul's reply was always "kids!" Paul became involved in politics and served three Iowa House terms where he led bipartisan support for groundbreaking sustainable agriculture and conservation legislation. Landmark achievements of Paul and his colleagues included the 1987 Groundwater Protection Act (including creation of the Leopold Center for Sustainable Agriculture at ISU); the 1989 Resource Enhancement and Protection (REAP) Act; and the 1990 Iowa Energy Act. He worked with colleagues to rename the SCS the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and reminded all that the agency's mission included the entire community: soil, water, air, plants, animals, and humans (SWAPA+H!). During his tenure, NRCS programs became more holistic, including the flagship Environmental Quality Incentives Program and the National Conservation Buffer Initiative. In the landmark publication "Geography of Hope," Paul called on Americans to understand the nation's working lands as the foundation of our economic and environmental health. After leaving the NRCS, Paul ran the Iowa Department of Natural Resources for Governor Vilsack in the early 2000s. After an unsuccessful run for the US House of Representatives in 2004, he retired to Decorah to share his experiences and networks by advising and mentoring environmental advocates and policymakers throughout the US, serving on various boards and commissions, giving inspiring speeches, writing book introductions and editorials, visiting his kids in Nicaragua, Sweden, France, China, and Australia, and watching his six granddaughters grow. In his later years he enjoyed weaving music into his essays for progressive Iowa "town hall" web site, Bleeding Heartland. Kellogg, Charles Edwin (2 Aug. 1902 - 9 Mar. 1980), soil scientist, was born near Ionia in Ionia County, Michigan, the son of Herbert Francis Kellogg, a farmer, and Eunice Irene Stocken Kellogg. Following graduation from Palo High School, Kellogg enrolled at Michigan State College, where he pursued studies in science and mathematics, and eventually specialized in the new field of soil science. At that time, Americans had begun to view soils as natural bodies, the creations of unique combinations of soil-forming factors. As a student, Kellogg participated in two major events in the utilization of soil data for planning. During the summers from 1923 through 1926, he did research and mapped soils for the land economic survey, an interdisciplinary project of the Michigan Department of Conservation. One objective of the survey was to help solve the problem of the cut-over lands, which had been logged by timber companies. The inefficient use of land vexed failing farmers and taxed the local economy and the state. Very early, Kellogg had learned to view soil properties in the context of their meaning to and interaction with the local society. He earned his bachelor of science degree in 1925 and remained at Michigan State College on a fellowship in soils, April 1926-April 1928, sponsored by the Michigan State Highway Department. Later he made a second contribution to the utilization of soils data. New concrete highways in some portions of Michigan had buckled. Kellogg made a study of the relationship between soil characteristics and the appropriate design for cement-concrete highways. The work led to definite procedures for highway construction in accordance with the soil conditions as assessed by detailed soil surveys. On December 25, 1925, Kellogg married Lucille Jeanette Reasoner; they had two children. From April 1928 until December 1929, Kellogg directed soil surveys and carried out research on soil genesis for the Wisconsin Geological and Natural History Survey. In 1930 Michigan State College of Agriculture and Applied Science awarded him a Ph.D. for his dissertation "Preliminary Study of the Profiles of the Principal Soil Types of Wisconsin." The study was in the new field of "pedology." In January 1930 Kellogg took an assistant professorship at the North Dakota Agricultural College, where he also was in charge of the soil survey program and land classification. He advised on the design of the soil survey of McKenzie County, North Dakota, so that it could be used in land classification for rural tax assessment. Once again, Kellogg made innovations in the area of what soil scientists would come to call "interpretations" of soil survey data for utilitarian purposes. His work in North Dakota brought him to the attention of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, whose soil scientists had responsibility for the soil survey, an activity that had started in 1899. In February 1934, Kellogg accepted a position specializing in land classification in the Bureau

		<p>of Chemistry and Soils. On 1 July 1934 he became acting chief, Division of Soil Survey, and then chief of the division on 1 July 1935. For nearly thirty-seven years Kellogg directed the work of the soil survey division. He sought to make the published soil survey a more useful document for farmers and other users. Curtis F. Marbut, Kellogg's predecessor, had worked to establish the soil survey as a scientific document, but he generally eschewed including "interpretations." Interpretations assessed the suitability of soils for particular uses such as for crops, forests, grazing, or a host of nonagricultural uses. Kellogg believed that the soil scientists themselves should work with other technical specialties to develop the interpretations of the soil survey. The early years of Kellogg's leadership focused on tools to improve and advance the soil survey. He wrote the first edition of the Soil Survey Manual (1937) to give soil scientists more precise instructions, definitions, and procedures. In 1936 he had issued a USDA publication Development and Significance of the Great Soil Groups of the United States. That publication was used widely in college classes and gave a rather full discussion, in qualitative terms, of the five factors of soil formation. Kellogg wrote extensively in a clear lucid style. His most popular book, The Soils That Support Us (1941), examined the relationship of soil properties to historical developments. Many of his writings concerned public policy in soils and agriculture, but others ranged more widely, such as the Scientific Monthly series "The Scientist and Social Policy in the Democratic State." (1942). After World War II, Kellogg traveled, studied, wrote, and spoke on world soil resources. He made tropical soils something of a specialty. His was one of only a few voices advising caution during the headlong exportation of Western agricultural technology. In Kellogg's opinion, Western agriculturalists should not recommend abandonment of traditional systems such as shifting cultivation, or slash and burn, until the supporting systems for a higher level of technology gradually developed. The merger of the soil survey division into the Soil Conservation Service on 19 November 1952 brought additional resources. Kellogg greatly accelerated the field mapping and publication of soil surveys. To accelerate the mapping and provide a more useful document, he took several initiatives. Intense soil survey institutes at cooperating universities informed soil scientists of the latest developments in soil science. He ordered the development of a new soil classification system. Soil Taxonomy (1975) made greater use of laboratory analysis and quantification in definitions. Quantifiable boundaries and parameters defined the various categories in the system. Greater precision in description enhanced interpretations. Kellogg hoped that the new classification system would aid transfer of both empirical experience and research results internationally. He initiated a soil geomorphology research program that not only achieved its immediate objective of aiding the soil survey but also gained international renown for its contributions to the discipline. Kellogg was also an avid reader and student of literature. James Joyce was his favorite writer; he also liked D. H. Lawrence, Marcel Proust, and the diarist John Evelyn. Kellogg encouraged students and his charges to become general readers so that reading became a habit. Beginning with mimeographed lists for students, he prepared several versions of the Reading for Soil Scientists, Together with a Library. On 31 May 1971 Kellogg retired from the U.S. Department of Agriculture. He died in Hyattsville, Maryland, and was buried in Palo, Michigan. Kellogg achieved one of the most distinguished careers in the history of soil science, a career marked by a dedication to assist land users through knowledge of soils. He attended college during the formative years of the young discipline termed soil science. As a student and young professor he made landmark contributions in "interpretations" of soil surveys.
