INTRODUCTION

"Real musicians have day jobs." ANONYMOUS

Since the dawn of the conservation movement in America, progress has been forged through personal relationships that transcend official channels. The nature of these efforts required not just the desire to maintain existing natural resources, but the foresight to sustain and improve them for future generations. Thus, this work depends on interactions at a human level, that address social behaviors in addition to scientific principles and learning. This is why so many career conservationists become well-known and respected members of their local communities. By adding an artistic element, these attributes reveal a certain subset of agency employees – the musicians. Through sharing their art form with family, friends, co-workers, clients, and the public, musicians of the Soil Conservation Service and the Natural Resources Conservation Service have enriched the lives and culture of their communities beyond their professional achievements.

The purpose of this project is to document and recognize those agency employees, past and present, who pursued and shared their musical art, in addition to achieving a professional career. The scope is limited to employees of the Soil Conservation Service and Natural Resources Conservation Service, as well as employees from partner agencies.

Information accumulated herein is presented in the form of concise biographies, which highlight the lives of employees who played or performed music. Also included are those who wrote about, produced, recorded, or promoted music. Each entry, comprised of three paragraphs, documents the following phases: Early Life, Musical Experience, and Professional Career. The format used for these biographies was inspired by and adapted from the written work of jazz critic Leonard Feather, who first developed this unique style for his book *Inside Be-Bop*, later retitled *Inside Jazz*, in 1949; then further refined in his *Encyclopedia of Jazz* published in 1954, now in its fifth edition.

How to use these biographies:

- Entries are listed in alphabetical sequence, based on last name.
- Cross references to other individual entries are shown with names in small capitals.
- Recordings, when listed, are indicated by artist or group, *title* in italics, format (in parentheses), and date.
- SCS and NRCS modifiers are used in approximate chronological order, as the Soil Conservation Service was renamed the Natural Resources Conservation Service in 1994.
